#### **Provider Updates**

Exodus Recovery successfully achieved **Medi-Cal re-certification** for the Crisis Stabilization Units **(CSU)** at the Be Well Campus, and HealthRIGHT 360 has received **Drug Medi-Cal (DMC)** certification.

Exodus Recovery underwent an annual site review from DHCS SRP (**Department of Health Care Services Social Rehabilitation Program**) to re-certify the Crisis Residential Program (**CRP**) to continue providing services. The CRP received an impressive passing score of 100%! The DHCS analyst shared that this is the first time she has given a program a score of 100%, demonstrating full regulatory compliance with no corrections needed.

#### **Data Findings**

In February, the Adult Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) admitted 187 individuals, averaging a daily utilization rate of 123%. The Adult CSU is compromised of 14 beds and serves as one of the two crisis services offered at the Be Well Orange Campus. The program is demonstrating the efficiency and effectiveness of both access and treatment interventions, stabilizing many in under 24 hours and transitioning to a next indicated level of care, allowing for immediate admissions of others in need of help. Most referrals to the Adult CSU were from self and family referrals, law enforcement, and emergency departments. Those who are not able to utilize the Be Well crisis residential program at the Campus are referred to clinically appropriate treatment providers and County mental health clinics as well as other outpatient resources. The majority of clients being provided services at the Adult CSU are Medi-Cal members (>65%).

In February, the Adolescent CSU admitted 66 adolescents with a daily utilization rate of 63%, a 25% increase from the prior month. With the capacity to serve up to 8 youths at a time, most referrals to the Adolescent CSU were from emergency departments, crisis services such as the CAT/PERT teams and the Be Well Mobile Response Team, and self and family referrals. Most of the youth at discharge were referred to mental health outpatient facilities or linked to higher levels of care, such as Aliso Ridge Behavioral Health and UCI Medical Center. Concurrent with the Adult CSU, most clients are Medi-Cal recipients, but 20% of clients this month had commercial insurance.

In February, the Crisis Residential Program (CPR) admitted 27 individuals, averaging a daily utilization rate of 81%. The 15-bed unit allows individuals to reside for up to 21 days. The CRP maintains a consistently high occupancy, as there is an ongoing need for this level of care in Orange County. The primary referrals source for the CPR program are Be Well's own Crisis Stabilization Unit and county CSU's.

In February, the Sobering Center admitted 114 individuals and had a daily utilization rate 62%. Most referrals to the sobering center came from self or family referrals, the Be Well Mobile Team, and Law Enforcement. As the first and only unit of its kind in Orange County, the Sobering Center provides specialized care to adults who are acutely intoxicated, as an alternative to an emergency room or jail. Most individuals are discharged from the Sobering Center with community resource recommendations, but some individuals are linked to crisis stabilization units and case managers when deemed appropriate.




# Adolescent Crisis Stabilization Unit
